








Figure 2. Forward Current vs. Ambient Temperature for InGaN






Figure 3. Forward Current vs. Pulse Length




Figure 4. Rel. Luminous Intensity vs. Angular Displacement




Figure 5. Forward Current vs. Forward Voltage




Figure 6. Rel. Luminous Intensity vs. Ambient Temperature




Figure 7. Rel. Lumin. Intensity vs. Forw. Current/Duty Cycle




Figure 8. Relative Luminous Intensity vs. Forward Current






Figure 9. Relative Intensity vs. Wavelength




Figure 10. Forward Current vs. Forward Voltage




Figure 11. Rel. Luminous Intensity vs. Ambient Temperature




Figure 12. Specific Luminous Intensity vs. Forward Current




Figure 13. Relative Luminous Intensity vs. Forward Current





Figure 14. Relative Intensity vs. Wavelength
